- 4. How does Max's Latinx/a/o heritage and cultural background contribute to their sense of identity?
- 5. What is the nature of Max's relationship with Tío J., and why does it hold significance in Max's life?
- 6. Max references Tolstoy's novel *Anna Karenina*, suggesting that unhappy families are unique. Do you agree with this perspective?
- 7. Describe Max's relationship with Tatabuela and discuss its impact on Max's identity.
- 8. Why does Max deeply resonate with Holden Caulfield and Phoebe's relationship in JD Salinger's *The Catcher in the Rye*?
- 9. Analyze Max's relationship with Mamá and explore why her illness affects Max so deeply.
- 10. Max's perspective is transformed by a lecture on two-spirit peoples during their visit to the university with Lara. Can you recall a similar experience from a class that shifted your outlook on life?
- 11. Max learns about the discrimination faced by Tío J. as a gay Latino. How have societal attitudes and treatment towards LGBTQ+ individuals evolved since the 1980s, and what aspects remain unchanged?
- 12. After discovering Vic's murder, how does Max cope with the loss? What impact does Vic's death have on Max?
- 13. Why are reading, drawing, and ultimately writing so crucial to Max? How do these activities serve importance in your own life?
